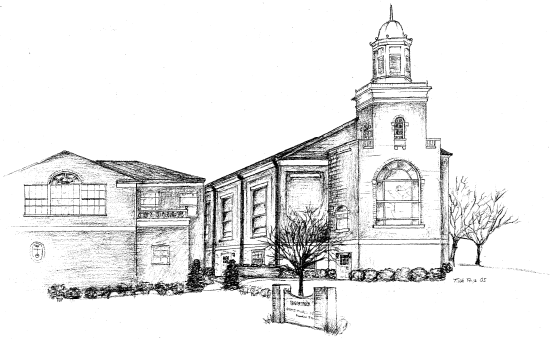

## From the Pastor's Desk...

Well, my intention for this month was to write a light 'have a nice summer' column, and remind you to come to church as often as you can. We've had a good, busy Spring and Easter season, plenty going on around the church with the new photo Church Directory and conversations about what it would mean for David's UCC to become an officially Open & Affirming congregation. While the summer will also be busy, in a very different way, with Confirmation Pilgrimage, Wednesday night specials and Church picnics, SALT workers, as well as General Synod for me, and vacations and preparations for the busy fall, I thought keeping the June letter a bit light would be a good thing.

And maybe a wiser pastor would be writing now about how your golf game is a lot like the faith journey, sometimes you're in the rough, sometimes you accidentally hit the ball well and you start to feel like you may just be getting the hang of this game, and God loves you even when you end up 12 over par, with a half a dozen snowmen (8's) on your scorecard. Maybe a smarter minister would come up with a cute, funny note about how the spiritual life, and probably life in general, "is a beach."

But this week, the week before I travel to be with 1700 ministers at the Festival of Homiletics, something small, almost unimportant happened. A small little ad has been created by a group called "Believe Out Loud," a group committed to gay and lesbian inclusion in the life of faith communities. In the brief video ad, a young boy enters a church followed by what one might suspect is his two moms, a lesbian couple. As the trio of visitors make their way down the aisle, looking for a place to sit, the folk in the pews appear to look at them judgmentally, some appear to be laughing, mocking, others fearful and afraid. When they finally reach the front of the small church, the minister greets them and smiles as he says, "Welcome... everyone."

The music that plays as they make that perilous journey into this unknown church, where it's not clear until the very end that someone is glad they are there, that someone intends for them to feel welcomed, is that song "For Once In My Life." It quietly and sadly says "I won't let sorrow hurt me, not like its hurt me before. For once I have something I know won't desert me, I'm not alone anymore. For once, I can say 'this is mine you can't take it,' as long as I know I have love, I can make it. For once in my life I have someone who needs me." It suggests the pain of rejection, the clear sense that there are other places in this family's life where they have known desertion, isolation, loneliness. They want, this little boy wants to be someplace where they are welcome, where every one is truly and lovingly welcomed.

While there are all kinds of underlying issues that the brief ad hints at – some churches theology and polity create real barriers for folk who are LGBT, some churches just have a hard time welcoming any stranger, any newcomer is looked at with uncertainty if not downright suspicion – the simple message is not about gay marriage, ordination for gays into the ministry, or anything else. It's simply about welcome and inclusion for all people. After the family is seated, there is a simple message: "Open your heart. Break the silence." And the website of the organization that made the ad, Believe Out Loud.

To be honest, it reminded me of a less ominous, less funny version of ads that were created by the United Church of Christ a few years back, when we were introducing the God is StillSpeaking campaign. You may remember the velvet rope ad, where bouncers stood outside a church and turned away those that weren't welcome. They let in a healthy, attractive middle-class white family, but turned away folk of color, a gay male couple, a person in a wheel chair. At the end it says, simply "Jesus didn't turn people away. Neither do we."

The "ejector" ad followed about a year later, it was a little more pointed, but funny. As an organ played and a family was finding their seats, a woman of color holds a crying baby that's not easily quieted. A hand hits an ejector button and they go flying. A gay couple sits close together and they get the same treatment. A man of color, perhaps a foreigner goes flying, and soon there are folk popping up like popcorn, including someone with a walker. Again the ad ended with a simple message "God doesn't reject people. Neither do we."

There you will find four different videos created by the national staff of the United Church of Christ, to carry our outreach message that "whoever you are, wherever you are on life's journey, you are welcome here." It's a simple, but I believe powerful message of Gospel affirmation, a word I believe many spiritually hungry people are longing to hear, but because they have known rejection or disapproval in some religious settings they don't know there are churches like ours that seek to practice an 'extravagant welcome,' and live into the radically inclusive love of God and neighbor.

You may remember that the UCC got a lot of attention on several news outlets when our ads were rejected by several major networks. CNN and MSNBC and many major outlets did news stories on the ad being rejected, and due to the controversy, the ad was aired again and again at no cost for advertising, getting way more airplay than we could ever have

budgeted as a denomination. I know personally about two dozen people who saw those ads, listened to the news coverage, and sought out a UCC church because of that bold, inclusive stance.

Well, that's all ancient history, or so I thought. The Believe Out Loud people also produced a print version with the same message of "Welcome, everyone," and sought to purchase a placement to have it run in Sojourners Magazine, a monthly publication "committed to social justice and peace." The fruit of Jim Wallis, often a voice for progressive evangelical Christians on issues of poverty, and the author of the best selling book, "God's Politics; Why the Right Gets It Wrong and the Left Doesn't Get It," Sojourners is an important voice on the intersection of faith and politics, often inspiring both progressive and conservative Christians to lives of greater faithfulness and service.

Sojourners rejected the ad. When pursued as to why, they said they didn't want to choose sides on these controversial issues. Again, this was not an ad supporting gay marriage, at least not directly, or calling for gays to be ordained. It merely said "Open your heart," and called for churches to embody the love and welcome we witness in Jesus as described in the Gospels.

In our conversations about being an Open & Affirming congregation here at David's Church, some have asked why do we have to vote and give ourselves some label, when we already strive to act that way to begin with, why try to fix something that doesn't appear to be broken? And I agree, it's far more important to be truly welcoming to everyone, than to call yourselves by that ONA label.

But as these ads and the little controversies they've created reveal, these tempests in a teacup suggest that for some parts of our population, there is still real brokenness, real rejection. They may have seen so much rejection, so much pain and disappointment over how they've been treated by religious folk, that they need a special invitation, a way to identify our congregation as one that is safe and welcoming for them and their families.

We may already be acting truly welcoming, truly open to loving and including our neighbors "whoever they are, wherever they have been on life's journey," but if we're not letting them know we are Open & Affirming, they may never feel it's safe to come inside. Whether they are straight or gay, whether they have questions and doubts or believe with utter certainty, whether they are healthy or sickly, whether they are well off or going without, whether they have a great family of support or feel lonely and isolated, there are many who need to know that they have someone to lean on, someone who won't desert them, so they don't have to be alone anymore.

Now I truly believe that the very best reason for David's Church to become ONA is because we're already embodying those values, and it's just, plain and simple, the right thing to do. But the reason I'm writing to you about it this month, instead of talking about missing that 5 inch putt or warning you to wear sun-block at the pool cause we want you to stay healthy for a long time, is that little boy in that ad.

All that kid wants is a place where his family, his two moms and he can go and worship God, and feel the love and acceptance of a community that is seeking to embody Jesus' love for the whole world, and all the people. But from the debates that have sprung up online over this silly little ad, and the controversy of Sojourners refusing to accept it, it is clear that there are a great many churches, a great many number of Christians who would not embrace that family, who would not make room for that needy little boy and his moms. We can be better than that, we can show families like that one the love and care of Jesus, the way folk have shown that love to each of us. I want that kid to know what it feels like to be loved, for once in his life.

## Notes from Rev. Daria

Summer is upon us and in the church that means trips and camp and Vacation Bible School and all kinds of other summer fun! While I am looking forward to the pleasures of farm stands brimming with fresh produce, swimming pools festooned with bright towels and excited children and long twilights full of outdoor music and fireflies, I am especially looking forward to my first Confirmation Pilgrimage! Along with my intrepid co-chaperones and eight awesome Confirmation students, I will be journeying to Atlanta for fun, learning and service in mid-June. We'll be making a full report to our stockholders later in the summer, so if you want a postcard from Atlanta and a ticket to the Stockholders' Luncheon, you are welcome to purchase stock up until the very last hour. We leave at 7 a.m. on June 15<sup>th</sup> and if you show up to see us off and buy a stock share or three, we will happily accept!

Another cool thing I get to do with Confirmation kids in June is a tour of the Islamic Center in West Chester. Our visits to worship with other faith communities are fun and informative. It's a shame I can't bring the rest of you along for them because they are a wonderful way to learn about other faith practices as we solidify our own beliefs, but I think Brian might be disappointed to process into an empty sanctuary on Sunday morning! However, since this will happen on a Friday night (June 10<sup>th</sup>, meet in parking lot at 5 p.m., carpooling encouraged), I would love to have anyone from the wider David's family who is interested tag along with us. Just let me know if you want to come and I will give the tour leader an

advance heads-up. There will be a 30-40 minute talk beginning at 6 p.m., then a tour of the facility, lasting a total of about an hour and a half. There is a suggested \$2 per person donation and visitors are asked to dress modestly, with legs covered at least to mid-calf, arms covered to wrist and scarves for women. Clothes should fit loosely.

June's first Sunday Family at Five event is also an opportunity to experience a bit of another faith community's life. We'll meet at 5 p.m. in the parking lot to caravan to Temple Israel (130 Riverside Drive in Dayton) for their Jewish Cultural Festival. This is a free event featuring music, games, food, crafts, entertainment, a temple tour, a mock wedding and even the chance to blow the shofar! It should be scads of fun and I hope a bunch of you turn out for it!

Kids finishing grades K-6 will also be able to have a ball here at David's for our Super Summer Specials, which will begin on Wednesday, June 15<sup>th</sup> and continue through July 27<sup>th</sup>. Our answer to the changing culture is VBS redefined. Parents can drop off kids at 6 p.m. and enjoy dinner out or a bit of shopping while kids have supper, engage with scripture, sing and do a special activity. At 8 p.m., we will close and send kids into the world with an idea for ways in which they can serve God. Each session will be a unit unto itself so that kids can enjoy family vacations or summer camps without missing a crucial piece, but the theme of Service will run through the entire summer. On picnic Wednesdays, June 22<sup>nd</sup> and July 20<sup>th</sup>, there will be no program and families are encouraged to attend the picnics. Our SALT workers, Nico Avila-John and Geoff Miller, will be instrumental, along with CE Board members, in orchestrating this program. Please give them a warm welcome on June 5<sup>th</sup>!

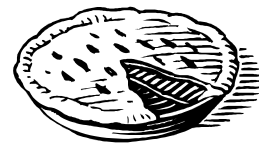
## June Birthday Party at Trinity

## Christian Education Corner

Thank you to all the volunteer teachers and shepherds that made the program possible during the school year. We really appreciate everyone sharing their time and talent.

June 5 Music Sunday: Many of the children will be participating in the service. There will be a Nursery and one class for preschoolers. Children from Kindergarten - 6th grade will sit with their parents. There will be packets available for them.

Church School moving into summer schedule: From June 12 through September 4 the church school will have a nursery, pre-school class for 3's-5's and a one room schoolhouse class for Kindergarten through 6th grade. Children will move to their new classes in the fall.

Super Summer Specials to replace Vacation Bible School: Instead of doing the traditional VBS, Christian Education is going to provide several Wednesday evening events for children. Starting June 15 there will be programming at the church or David's Grove from 6:00-8:00 for children, Kindergarten - 6th grade. The program will include supper, song, scripture and a special activity. The Super Summer Specials will focus on service and children will be sent out to service at the end of each session, with suggestions for ways they can be the church in the world. Parents are not required to stay, so plan on going out to dinner or shopping. Each Wednesday will be its own discrete unit so, although there is an overlying theme, children who miss a session or two due to camp, vacation, etc, will not be out of the loop.

Super Summer Specials are scheduled for Wednesdays beginning June 15<sup>th</sup> and going through the end of July. On picnic dates, there will be no Super Summer Specials and families are encouraged to attend the picnics. Look for more information in the bulletin.

SALT workers: In case you are new to David's, SALT stands for Summer Adult Leadership Training. SALT was started at David's Church in the 90's. It is a program that provides leadership training to young adults about David's church and the greater UCC church. Many of our present members have participated in the program. This year the SALT committee has hired two college students, *Nico Avila-John* and *Geoff Miller*. The SALT program will run from June 6-August 7. The young adults will be working 40 hours a week and will be spending time with both pastors as well as other leaders in the church. *Dotti Ankeney* will be coordinating the program. If you have a project or program that you would like the SALT workers to help with please let Dotti know. There are request forms in the office.

## A Community Town Hall to discuss Ohio State Bill 5 on June 6 at 7 pm

David's UCC, together with our friends at LIFT Greater Dayton and the non-partisan League of Women Voters, will host a public forum and discussion of this important bill and its impact on our community. In calling for the ending of collective bargaining rights as a necessary provision of meeting a balanced budget for the State of Ohio, this bill has raised important ethical and moral questions about our relationship to public workers, educators and the way our public officials will direct state moneys in the coming years. We're hearing stories of schools losing up to 20% of their budgets, and declines throughout the state in public services at the same time that tax breaks are being offered to corporations. We

want to listen to our neighbors and friends and reflect on the kind of community we envision for our state and community's future. As people of faith, we're asking what is fair, honorable and dignified for those willing to serve as our police, emergency responders, teachers and other public employees? Our State Representative Peggy Lehner will be joining us to listen to both sides of this debate, and to allow folk to share their stories and concerns. We hope you'll come to listen and participate in the conversation.

Two weeks later, LIFT Greater Dayton will reconvene after doing a listening campaign throughout the communities where our religious congregations live and work, to discern if this organization should play a role, take a stand on this issue in the coming election season. That meeting will also meet here at David's on Monday, June 20 at 7 pm.

## Interested In Taking An Adult Level Confirmation Class?

Over the course of my nearly 28 years of ministry, folk have often enjoyed my classes, whether we were using Kerygma, Living the Questions or doing other Bible or book studies as primary curriculum. Those have been some great times for learning, but often folk have also reported that a real time of learning for them was when they were parenting or mentoring young people through the confirmation process. Either reading the textbook, or engaging in conversation around the topics their children were studying in their confirmation class, folk admitted that they were learning more about their faith, thinking more concretely about it than ever before. You know, people have said to me, you ought to offer a confirmation class for grown ups.

Well, that's what we're going to do this Fall. Rev. Newcomb will convene a class that will meet weekly through the Fall, using the same text Pastor Daria is using with our 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> graders, "Affirming Faith," and supplementing the topics with dvds from "Dream-Think-Be-Do" series, an overview of progressive Christianity from the folk who created "Living the Questions." For this to be effective, we need folk to commit to make it to as many classes as they are physically able, and to attend regularly to the reading and writing assignments. As the book is designed to work through the United Church of Christ Statement of Faith, this class would be a great reminder of our faith tradition and values for folk who grew up in the tradition as well as those new to the UCC. By the end of the class we will ask each person to write their own personal faith statement, to be shared with each other, just as our confirmands read their statements as their last act before Confirmation.

So, wish you knew more about the Christian faith, and about the United Church of Christ, or a more progressive approach to Christianity? Looking for a place to ask questions and take your faith journey to the next level? Want to reconnect with your faith, find new ways to express your spirituality, wanting to find a meaningful outlet beyond worship on Sunday mornings? This might be the class for you. We want to make sure we allow folk who are interested in taking the class to help design the schedule so that the greatest number of interested persons can participate. As Tues. evenings are often set aside for Boards and Council, and Thursdays are for Choir, we're looking at Monday or Wednesday evenings, or on Sunday afternoon or evening. If you have interest, please contact Pastor Brian soon, and share your meeting time preference. As the scripture says, "Come let us reason together."
