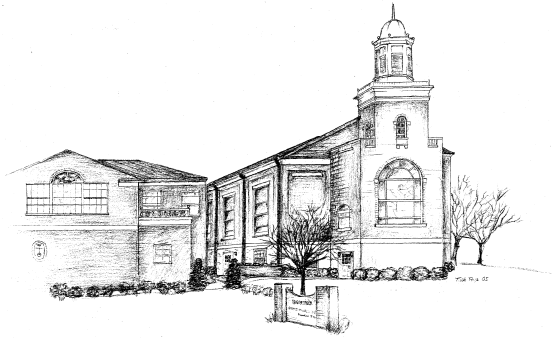

From the Pastor's Desk...

The sign out front says that David's United Church of Christ was founded back in 1826, which if my math holds, means that this year our congregation has reached its 185th anniversary.

Congratulations! And, let me be the first to say that you don't look your age.

So what does it mean that David's Church has a history that is moving slowly but surely toward completing its second century? For one, it suggests that our roots run deep. When David Winters started this congregation, he'd already helped to plant more than a dozen others around the Miami Valley. The stone on the front of our sanctuary says that we were a Reformed & Lutheran congregation, carrying forward the theological values and traditions of various German Protestant expressions.

Now, the faith tradition that gave us David's Church evolved from the Protestant Reformation's break with the Catholic Church in the 1500s. As the Enlightenment, modernism and science became a threat to literal readings of sacred text, folk that developed the faith that we inherited tended to bring faith and knowledge, religion, science and culture into a complimentary tension, sharing the same sphere of influence.

In the last century there was a spirit of optimism that was decidedly ecumenical, inviting many to find meaningful ways to come together. This became official in 1934 in the collaboration of the Evangelical & Reformed Church, and further expanded in 1957 for the creation of the United Church of Christ, which has always been a voice of this more critical, nuanced and social justice minded expression of faith.

At Eden Seminary, there's a professor who liked to tell of the German immigrants who arrived in America's Midwest, many from a Reformed and Lutheran background, that adopted the name Evangelical (not to be confused with modern folk who embrace the same word). Many sought out Protestant congregations, and quite a number stumbled upon Missouri Synod Lutheran churches. There they found folk who read the Bible literally, and preached against the drinking of beer, and they quickly wrote back to the old country to send for ministers trained in Europe that were, well, for lack of a better words, more modern minded and "progressive."

Early leaders in the denominations that bound themselves together in the United Church had an impressive history, defined by acts of service, justice, and inclusion. Our ancestors in faith back in Europe were part of the scholarly movements of higher criticism that led to a more contextual, historical & metaphorical reading of the Bible. And, Christian pietists and activists were busy trying to connect faith into acts of meaningful living and justice. The earliest abolitionists seeking to end slavery, and win women the right to a vote, were often rooted in congregations like ours, which later were a part of the UCC.

So, a congregation with 185 years of history, David's Church has solid roots and traditions, but it also has to have the ability to adapt to new circumstances, changes in the culture and world around the church. No church that has remained relevant and vital as the culture changed around them can stay locked down to old ways of doing things. It's been said that the seven last words of a dying congregation would be "We've never done it that way before." So a church that once had separate entrances for men and women, has adapted over the years, welcoming women as lay leaders and pastors.

Over and over again, David's has strived to speak the good news of God's love into the world of everyday people, in each successive era. Reformation faith is always re-forming, and our tradition suggests that "each generation is responsible for rethinking its beliefs, as God's word unfolds and conditions change." As faithful people, David's Church has strived to live into new ways of being and doing, whether it meant sharing in an interfaith Thanksgiving service with Catholics, Methodists and Jews, or adding an elevator so that folk with disabilities who have trouble with stairs can still get around our building, we have been a people that always made room for others.

The willingness to work with others is another defining characteristic at work in a congregation with a lengthy legacy like ours. David's has a great history of working with others, and seeking to serve the needs of the community, whether it's hands on at a Habitat build or an 'extreme makeover' for a needy local family with children with autism. Congregations with a meaningful history are never merely self-serving, but they respond to needs in the community, whether it's feeding homeless folk at a shelter once a month, putting a jar of peanut butter in the backpack of hungry kids or participation in the Neighbors In Need offering.

Among other things—All Saints' Day, Remembrance/Memorial Funds acknowledgements, Communion, Bring a Friend & Mission: 1 Sunday—on Sunday, Nov. 6 we will be celebrating all that David's Church is now, here on our 185th anniversary. Come participate in this meaningful celebration of our life, our members, those who have passed, and all that we can accomplish when we work together. There will be "birthday cake" at the coffee hour after the 9:50 service, so come let us recall what has come before even as we await with anticipation what God has planned for us in the next 15 years, and the next century.

Notes from Rev. Daria

I was not a fan of November when I was younger. I always dreaded the brown and grey days of drear. I thought 19th-century poet Thomas Hood summed it up nicely in this snippet:

"No warmth, no cheerfulness, no healthful ease,
No comfortable feel in any member -
No shade, no shine, no butterflies, no bees,
No fruits, no flowers, no leaves, no birds -
November!"

However, the longer I live, the more I begin to appreciate the season. While I still prefer the exuberant blooms of spring and the lush autumn leaves, I can now see some beauty in November. I can appreciate the pause between the revelry of Halloween and the hectic Advent and Christmas seasons. In the morning, I would awake to the smell of the turkeys roasting and at the breakfast table, I would often spot a deer against the backdrop of the surrounding woods. I still get all excited about the Macy's parade, watching shiny-eyed like a little kid as each float appears. As 5 p.m. drew near, we would load the car with our contributions and head for Grandma Gen's (truly over the river and through the woods) where we would gather with 2 other families. Now, strangers live in Grandma Gen's house and the entire older generation has passed, but the warmth of those candlelit November Thursdays of laughter and love lives on in us younger kids. This year, Jeannene and I will host in our new home.

That means we need some practice! If you need to get geared up for Thanksgiving, too, join Family at Five for Practice Thanksgiving on Sunday, November 6th at 5 p.m. in Fellowship Hall. Bring one of your family's favorite Thanksgiving dishes, along with table service for your family. After dinner, we'll stave off the turkey coma by doing some Thanksgiving crafts! Support Neighbors in Need on November 6

The Neighbors in Need offering, which we will receive on November 6, supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. Through UCCTakeAction.org, our national Justice and Witness Ministries office offers UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice. Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hock in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

For eleven days in November, the entire UCC will make good on its motto, "That they may all be One", with a campaign to gather more than one million food items for local food banks from collective congregations nationwide.

In the 11 days the UCC will collect more than a million healthy food items for local food banks and outreach services.

In the 11 days the UCC will make a push to also gather contributions for Neighbors in Need offerings that will be shared for hunger-action purposes with various agencies.

In other words, we of the UCC are making a concentrated effort to help feed the hungry.

Our David's campaign will last from NOW until the end of November. Please bring any food items that you can and place them on the tables in the Narthex. If it is peanut butter for the Kettering Backpack Program, it will be distributed to that effort. If it is food to help fill Thanksgiving & Christmas baskets, it will be used in basket preparation. If there are other food items that don't fit into those categories, those items will be given to either the Dayton Food Bank or St. Paul Outreach Program. Any monetary offerings will go directly to NIN (Neighbors in Need) agencies.

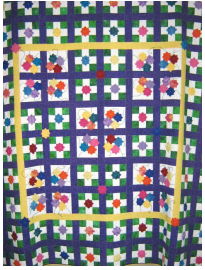

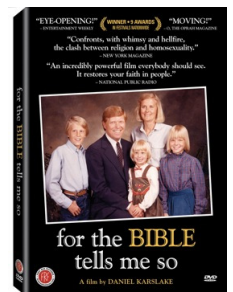

The quilters envisioned hope for a cure of all cancers as each flower "bloomed" on the quilt. ONA Conversations & Forum on Sunday, November 13

We've had two public forums so far this year, alongside our seminars with a Biblical scholar, a biologist, and PFLAG members, as we've walked together through the process. As we have discussed the reality of our already existing welcome to all people at David's UCC, and struggled with the concept of being an official Open and Affirming congregation of the United Church of Christ, some have expressed concerns that those uncomfortable with the label will feel unwelcome in our church if we focus so much attention on the welcome of lesbian & gay persons. Others feel that this extravagant welcome is so much a part of our identity at David's and in the larger UCC that becoming ONA is just the next logical step in our attempt to live faithfully in these trying times.

Some tell us they think we've been doing this too long, and can't wait for it to end, one way or another. Some others wonder if we haven't done the process too quickly, that maybe we should extend the process for another 6 months, or year. Ultimately it will fall to the Elders and then the Council to decide if we're ready to go to vote around a statement at the Congregational Meeting set for January 29. We all share the same goal, to live out to the best of our ability the love of God for all people, the question before us is how best to do it, what can help us in that process/path, what gets in the way?

All of which is to say that the next and last church family forum on our current schedule is Sunday, November 13, at 11:15 in the Fellowship Hall, using a more intimate, roundtable format. The Elders will lead this opportunity for statements of concern and questions, hopes and dreams.

If the crafted statement is recommended for a vote, it will be published in the January Dateline. Those who would like to participate in the crafting a statement that expresses the unique character and concerns of David's UCC are invited to convene in the Conference room on Wednesday, Nov. 2 at 7 pm.

Many who have watched the film “for the BIBLE tells me so” have found it a helpful presentation of the issues around LGBT inclusion in the life of the church, from Biblical interpretation to the challenges that face families with gay and lesbian children. Rev. Newcomb will host a showing on Saturday, November 12 at 6:30 p.m. We'll have pizza & a movie and a brief conversation about the film and it's implications for Christians who want to understand and love others, and do the right thing. Please RSVP at brian@davidsucc.org so we can be sure to have plenty to eat.

If you continue to have issues around this effort, Pastors Brian & Daria want to remind you that they are available for private conversations either in our offices, or out at your homes or a nearby coffee shop. Come let us reason together, and let love be our law.

In our family's 40 plus years at David's Church, we have had four pastors and a parade of interims. Nevertheless, even during pastor-less times we have not been leader-less, and projects like the Buckeye Brigade, Spaghetti Dinner, Lenten Suppers, the Rummage Sale, and the revived Christmas Bazaar have continued with congregational leadership and support.

I also love that David's Church has outreach programs.

- when it reaches out to Christ United Methodist Church, St. Charles parish, and Temple Beth Or for a service of Thanksgiving,
- when it prepares and serves food at Gateway,
- when it sews cozy hats, scarves, and mittens for donations to homeless centers,
- and when it collects bucketsful of peanut butter for school children who might not otherwise have enough to eat when they are not at school.

I sure you all could add your own reasons why you are a part of this church, but for me it finally comes down to this:

The loving-ness of David's Church is not its building or its steeple.

It lies instead in the generosity of its people.
