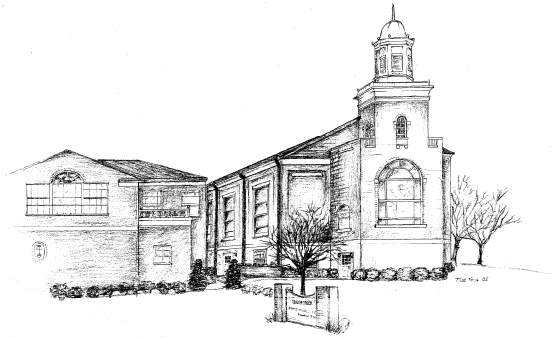

From the Pastor's Desk...

Last month, I wrote some on why “labels” have become more necessary and helpful due to the changing cultural landscape that surrounds the world of the church – where we live and move and find our being. Well, at least, where I as a religious professional work out my own salvation with fear & trembling, as suggested by the Apostle Paul’s Letter to the Philippians.

Of course, the one thing we’ve been trained to rely on – beyond the old joke about death & taxes – is change. And, we know from experience change is not only often necessary, but it can be good, growth cannot happen without change. Still, we also acknowledge that even “good” change come with loss, which can leave us disoriented and sad.

So, what has changed, exactly? Well, look around you, it appears that almost everything has changed. One way to observe how culture has changed and the church responded is to explore the way pastoral roles have evolved in many congregations, as an attempt to stay relevant and meet the needs of everyday folk busy with day to day demands.

I’ve been in the work of ministry as a professional for nearly three decades, so I can report that ministerial expectations have shifted dramatically over that time. One of my mentors in St. Louis, when I settled there to begin my ministry in 1983, liked to compare his work and role to that of a bank officer or school executive. Stan had been groomed in seminary to think of the pastor as one of the growing professional fields, not unlike school principals, doctors and lawyers. In that period (the 50’s and 60’s), the Pastor’s Study was re-focused and renamed as the Minister’s Office.

The previous model for the pastor as the spiritual leader of a neighborhood community, living and working among a close-knit congregation evolved into something modeled on executive work habits. You’ll remember that family doctors gave up house-calls in that era, and if you wanted to see your pastor you would no longer drop by his house where his office was located just off the parlor. Folk learned to make an appointment before coming by during business hours, as folk were driving distances and minister’s schedules became more and more shaped by meetings as well as community outreach and visits. There was also a shift geographically as improved cars and roads allowed people to live more broadly, and thus less connected in day to day life.

My friend, Stan, long since retired, used to explain that a pastor should be in their chair at their desk, groomed in a suit and tie of course, by 9:15 everyday, just like other professionals. In my youthful impudence, I once asked how many bankers had evening meetings or classes, or spent their late afternoons making hospital visits, but Stan liked to insist that ministry was taking on new gravitas as a professional undertaking. Indeed, seminaries for several decades took on the flavor of a professional school, like medical schools for doctors or law schools for lawyers.

Another colleague, George was schooled and shaped for ministry two decades after Stan, and two before me. He shared that while training for his work, he’d been given direction down very different paths. By the time, he was being sent out into the church, the world had rejected many of the authorized roles of the professional world. His preparation included the unique paths of knowledge and learning that pastors, preachers and teachers in the church of every generation are expected to master, like the Bible, its languages & cultures, and the evolving theology of history through the everyday concerns of common folk. But for George’s generation, pastoral ministry was shaped by more public political issues and more private therapeutic concerns.

People, he was told, come to the church to work out their spiritual issues and questions. When those questions take the shape of political concerns, whether they be around economic or civil rights, the pastor functions more as an organizer and movement supporter. When those questions arise from the experience of personal trauma or loss in their life, like a good psychologist or social worker, pastors acted more as therapists, bringing the spiritual disciplines of the church to the aid of individuals on a quest for personal insight, knowledge and understanding.

Some clergy emphasized one or the other, but in reality, congregations were not choosing pastors to embody one role over and against another, but looking for leaders who could do it all – counsel the individual, organize the masses, preach a sermon that speaks to the vast needs of different individuals, develop a compelling youth program, teach a good class for whomever might show up, and reach out to the community and evangelize those who would become new members. New roles and expectations were added, but the old ones remained as well.

And, all of this expectation was growing as congregations were experiencing a noticeable decline in attendance and financial support, as folk were expressing less commitment to institutions at every level in modern life – whether it be the PTO, the Kiwanis or the Masons, folk were far less inclined to join a service organization and attend a local church congregation, or support it financially than they were in generations past.

Some blame the advent of television or the internet for the sense of isolation that has grown up in our culture, perhaps it was air conditioning that moved folk off their front porches where community happened to isolation in doors. This cultural shift is documented in the book, “Bowling Alone: America’s Declining Social Capital,” which chronicles the decline of community in people’s everyday experience. Less people join leagues, suggested the writer, and those that do bowl, tend to bowl alone or in smaller groups.

That's an apt description for the institutional church in a world where the fastest growing group in religious surveys are those who say "None." Or where, more often than not, folk define themselves as "spiritual, but not religious." Less people are joining churches, and those that do attend tend to avoid deeper entanglements or membership altogether, this study suggests.

All this talk about the cultural changes in our lives suggests that more than ever we need to work to communicate what is unique and special about the spiritual community that David's Church is, a place where folk are encouraged to live their questions, a progressive community where faith comes to life. Fifteen years ago, I remember the debate over whether I should fire my church secretary because she was unwilling to take the courses we were offering to help her become more computer literate. These days, we expect our church secretaries to be computer ready and internet savvy, willing to develop skills in website design and social networking to help us in our ministry outreach.

We may long for the past, an era that we tend to think was simpler, less complicated and confusing, where folk went to school and church and shopped where they lived. We wish our communities were stronger, where neighborhood meant something, where community institutions were stronger, and connections lasted longer and folk acted in ways that were more reliable. But we are called to live and embody our faith in the present, to minister to the people of today, to live into ministries that meet their current needs, make them want to be involved in the life of a congregation, in the mission of our church. We can't turn back the clock, even if we wanted to, any more than we can un-invent the television and turn off the internet.

I believe God is calling us to vital and loving ministry and mission in the world of today, here in Kettering, Oakwood, Centerville, and Greater Dayton. As pastor, I know that folk want and sometimes need me to be a good Biblical preacher & teacher, a professional who can help lead and develop other congregational leaders, but also at times a therapist, an organizer, an evangelist, a church growth expert, a philosopher, and occasionally an entertainer. Unlike the Apostle Paul, I know I will fail to be "all things to all people." But in today's world, I believe folk are looking for pastors and leaders who are willing to put down roots and be real, theologians-in-residence who can bring the resources of the faith to the challenges of the new day. They are looking for churches that are truly communities of welcome and encouragement for the tasks of living with joy and satisfaction.

They are looking for congregations where they will be welcomed and valued and affirmed, no matter who they are, or where they have been on life's journey. They are looking for progressive communities where their questions and longings will be honored, and they can work out their salvation in fear and trembling as faith comes to life. I believe folk are looking for a church like David's UCC. We just have to let them know that we're here, what we stand for, and let them know that we strive to live out a welcome that truly welcomes everyone.

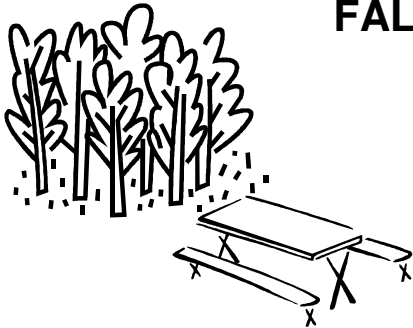

So What's The Deal With The Dream Jar?

We are engaged in a dialog here at David's; with ourselves and with God. We are continually working through and developing who we are, as individuals and as a congregation. It is not easy. It is challenging; and, as soon as you think you have it worked out, something changes. Sometimes for the better, and sometimes for the worst, but change comes and disrupts the comfort zone we have worked so hard to create. An early life lesson for most of us was, "The only thing constant in life is change"(François de la Rochefoucauld). The Dream Jar is about change. We already know it is inevitable; we might as well be prepared.

The Dream Jar is about dreaming as a congregation. It is about imagining the future. It is about constructing a vision for what we want David's to be in the future. It is about creating something to work toward; a path or a direction for our congregation. So when we are faced with change we are ready to react; to answer when Jesus knocks on our door.

So why is dreaming important? I would like to share a few perspectives on why dreaming and imaging the future is important:

- Everything you can imagine is real. (Pablo Picasso)

- We need men who can dream of things that never were. (John F. Kennedy)

- I dream, therefore I become. (Cheryl Renée Grossman)

- To accomplish great things, we must dream as well as act. (Anatole France)
- Imagination is the beginning of creation. You imagine what you desire, you will what you imagine and at last you create what you will. (George Bernard Shaw)
- So many of our dreams at first seem impossible, then they seem improbable, and then, when we summon the will, they soon become inevitable. (Christopher Reeve)
- I believe that [everyone] is the keeper of a dream - and by tuning into one another's secret hopes, we can become better friends, better partners... (Oprah Winfrey)
- It is difficult to say what is impossible, for the dream of yesterday is the hope of today and the reality of tomorrow. (Robert H. Goddard)
- We do not need magic to transform our world. We carry all the power we need inside ourselves already. We have the power to imagine better. (J.K. Rowling)

The first step in being ready is to understand who we are and where we want to go. What is important to us? To imagine a world without hunger, a world without injustice, a world without judgement... To imagine a world of healing, a world of caring and support, a world of personal relationships with God... What does the congregation of David's want David's the church to be doing? Are there services we need to be providing to one another and/or to the community? Are their missions we should be supporting? Is there education and self-awareness needs we should be focusing on? What role do we want David's to have in our lives, in our community, and the world in 10, 25, or 50 years.

I am not here to give you the answers. I am here to ask the question, "What is your Dream for David's." Please, take a moment. Think about it. Pray about it. Imagine it. Dream it. Share it in the Dream Jar.

Mission:1 is coming to David's UCC in November

The goal of Mission: 1 throughout the churches of the United Church of Christ for the first 11 days of the 11th month of the 11th year of our new millennium is quite simple: One United Church on a shared mission to feed the hungry and confront food-related injustice.

This mission effort was proposed by the National UCC officers at General Synod in Tampa in early July, and it's been embraced by the local Southwest Ohio Northern Kentucky Association as the theme for our SONKA meeting at St. John's UCC in Newport, KY, on Saturday, Nov. 5. David's Church is sending video of our monthly program to feed the homeless down at the Gateway and our peanut butter ministry for youth in the Kettering schools who need help with food on the weekends.

Still, while we already do a lot with mission around the issue of hunger, David's Mission Board has invited us to go the extra mile and commit to participate wholeheartedly in this national eleven day campaign, to collect 1,000,000 items of food across the United Church of Christ, to support the Neighbors In Need offering (which supports our hunger related ministries), and to write letters with Bread for the World to our governmental representatives asking them to support domestic and foreign policies that will end hunger in rural areas and our inner cities and in distant lands like Somalia and Kenya.

So, let's think and plan ahead. We will be sharing with you a sample letter to write to our Representatives and Senators and the White House in the October Dateline, we hope each home would commit to write one letter, and some might write 10. Let us prayerfully consider how we might increase our Neighbors In Need offering as a response to the challenge to take on hunger in our world. And finally, we gather all kinds of food each fall, donations for the food pantries, peanut butter, for holiday meals to go out to families with need in our community at Thanksgiving & Christmas, what would happen if we gathered all that food in during those first 11 days of November, to help contribute to this nation-wide in-gathering?

We already do a lot, perhaps this year we might rise to this challenge and do and give a bit more. It's Mission: 1. Look for more news to follow in October, but be thinking of ways that you and your family can be involved. Let's plan to be here on Nov. 6 to dedicate all the letters and food that has come in. It's also Bring-A-Friend Sunday, what a great opportunity to celebrate what we can do when we put our heads and hearts and hands and resources together on behalf of the hungry in our world.
